BOWLED OVER

Mount Waverley Bowling Club Inc. – SMOKING POLICY

In accordance with the new Victorian Tobacco Reforms commencing 1st August 2017, smoking will be banned:

- In outdoor areas at hospitality and food venues used for eating food.
 This includes footpath dining areas, courtyards and beer gardens during times food is being eaten, or is available to be eaten
- In all outdoor areas at food fairs. A food fair is an event where the principal activity is the supply of food for consumption at the event
- Within 10 metres of a food stall or food vendor at organised outdoor event (other than food fair)

To complement smoke-free outdoor dining, smoking is banned in an outdoor drinking area if any part of that area is within 4 metres of an outdoor dining area, unless separated by a wall of at least 2.1 metres high.

Designated smokers' areas will be displayed soon.

Mount Waverley Bowling Club Inc Child Safe Code of Conduct

This Code of Conduct outlines appropriate standards of behaviour by adults towards children.

The Code of Conduct aims to protect children and reduce any opportunities for abuse or harm to occur. It also helps staff and volunteers by providing them with guidance on how to best support children and how to avoid or better manage difficult situations. This Code of Conduct applies to all people involved in Mount Waverley Bowling Club Inc. activities, including coaches, officials, volunteers, and parents.

All Mount Waverley Bowling Club Inc. staff and volunteers are responsible for promoting the safety and wellbeing of children and young people by:

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- Adhering to our Child Safe Policy, this Code of Conduct, and other Mount Waverley Bowling Club Inc policies
- Taking all reasonable steps to protect children from abuse
- Treating everyone with respect, including listening to and valuing their ideas and opinions
- Welcoming all children and their families and carers and being inclusive
- Respecting cultural, religious and political differences and acting in a culturally sensitive way, particularly when interacting with children who are Aboriginal or otherwise culturally or linguistically diverse and those with a disability
- Modelling appropriate adult behaviour
- Listening to children and responding to them appropriately
- Reporting and acting on any breaches of this Code of Conduct, complaints or concerns appropriately and treat them seriously and with respect.
- Complying with our guidelines on physical contact with children
- Working with children in an open and transparent way – other adults should always know about the work you are doing with children
- Respecting the privacy of children and their families, and only disclosing information to people who have a need to know.

Mount Waverley Bowling Club Inc. staff and volunteers **MUST NOT**:

- Seek to use children in any way to meet the needs of adults
- Ignore or disregard any concerns, suspicions or disclosures of child abuse
- Use prejudice, oppressive behaviour or language with children
- Engage in rough physical games
- Discriminate on the basis of age, gender, race, culture, vulnerability or sexuality
- Initiate unnecessary physical contact with children or do things of a personal nature that children can do for themselves, such as toileting or changing clothes
- Develop 'special' relationships with specific children or show favoritism through the provision of gifts or inappropriate attention
- Exchange personal contact details such as phone number, social networking site or email addresses with children
- Have unauthorised contact with children and young people online or by phone.

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By observing these standards, you acknowledge your responsibility to immediately report any breach of this code to Mount Waverley Bowling Club Inc-OHS Co-Ordinator.

Mount Waverley Bowling Club Inc will review this Code of Conduct annually.

COACHES CORNER

DUTIES OF A LEAD


- 1. The lead is the most important member of the team.
 2. Before the start of the first end, discuss with your skip which side of the green they wish you to play. Don't change sides unless called upon to do so by your skip or unless you ask to change, and your wish is granted.
- 3. Notwithstanding the above, you need to have the ability to judge a green and to choose the hand which is the more reliable.
- 4.To look for instructions from you Skip as to where he would like the mat placed.
- 5.To be able to roll the jack to the indicated length. (Within 1 metre is good)
- 6.To draw two bowls as close as possible to the jack. If your first bowl is short ENDEAVOUR to bowl your second bowl behind the jack but within half a metre. 7.If the previous end has been lost or if you lose the toss for mat, hand the jack to the opposing player after the mat has been laid and then hand the bowl to him/her. Only hand the first bowl each end.

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8. The lead sets the pattern of play each end and dictates whether the team can adopt offensive or defensive tactics 9. To acquire personal qualities which allow relaxed concentration throughout a Game and support for other team members
